
RENEWING OUR COVENANT WITH CREATION

A Spring Education Series Hosted by Christ Church Cathedral

How might we bear faithful witness to God's love for all creation? We will survey the causes and impact of climate change and ponder how we might face these crises with courage while deepening our environmental stewardship in practical ways. MAY 15, 6:30-8:30 p.m.
Film: "How to Let Go of the World
(and Love all the Things Climate Can't Change)"

How do we put a face on the crisis of climate change? Oscar-Nominated Director Josh Fox takes us on a personal journey across 12 countries and 6 continents to explore the impact of the burgeoning environmental crisis. Though it may be too late to stop some of the worst consequences, we are asked to ponder the question: What is so deep within us that no calamity can take it away?

MAY 22, 6:30-8:30 p.m.

"Nothing in Moderation: Understanding, Stopping, Then Reversing Global Climate Change"
A talk by Dr. Paul Barten

This presentation will focus on: (1) the cumulative causes (since ~1820) of global climate change, (2) the actions needed to halt then reverse it, and (3) the foundational importance of our core values and faith as antidotes to complacency and selfishness. By re-examining our definition of affluence and systematically replacing gray technologies with green technologies, we can restore hope and stability to a world in urgent need of both.

Dr. Paul Barten, professor at UMass Amherst, has worked since 1985 on US and Canadian forest conservation and water resources. He co-authored, with Dr. Avril de la Crétaz, "Land Use Effects on Streamflow and Water Quality in the Northeastern United States (2007)" and has served on four National Academies project teams (1997 to present).

"Healing the Earth and Healing the Soul"

The Rev. Dr. Margaret Bullitt-Jonas serves as Missioner for Creation Care for the Episcopal Diocese of Western MA and the Massachusetts Conference, United Church of Christ. She preaches, teaches, and leads retreats about our spiritual and moral power to address climate change and other threats to life on Earth. Her newest book, "Rooted and Rising: Voices of Courage in a Time of Climate Crisis," co-edited with Leah Schade, will be published in November by Rowman & Littlefield in time for Earth Day's 50th anniversary in 2020. Film: "Taking Root: The Vision of Wangari Maathai"

Dr. Wangari Maathai (1940-2011) was born and raised in a rural village in Kenya during a time of strife and conflict. Educated in mission school then in the U.S. and Germany, she left a prestigious faculty position at the University of Nairobi to found The Greenbelt Movement (https://www.greenbeltmovement.org/), empowering women to plant trees (3 billion and counting) to restore ecosystems and revitalize communities. She was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 2004 for her remarkable work at the nexus of environmental stewardship, democracy, and peace. Her vision, life, and legacy demonstrate what faith and action can accomplish in the face of adversity and seemingly insurmountable challenges. Please join us for a screening of this outstanding film (by Lisa Merton and Alan Dater) followed by a discussion.
